Sorry we couldn't get any news on the Atari scene for this month's issue but you can have our review on one of Atari's early releases.

In this issue we will review 'Eastern Front'.

Eastern Front is a pleasing strategic game in which you play the war time germans invading communist Russia. Although graphically it is inferior to many other games, they are bold and serve there purpose.

On the sound front (get it ?), incorrect choices are rewarded with a grating buzz and little else.

But despite the piss poor sound and graphics this game is rather absorbing and has kept me glued to a fuzzy television screen for over three hours at a time.

Although my score has never got over fifty five. This was originally distributed with most new Atari's. So if you dig deep enough within your collection, you'll probably find it somewhere.

The supplied listing is a game called Dragon Run by Peter and Mark Wright. In this game you are a 'Dragon runner', this basically means you have to run away from the dragon. To do this you

must use your joystick controller to move your little man on the screen.

The aim of the game is to get from the bottom of the screen to the top of your screen and into the castle.

You must beware as a computer controlled dragon is chasing you a round the screen.

The secret of the game lies in the glades and copses on the Dark Forest which bars your way to the castle. Neither you or the dragon can pass through the Dark Forest, but if you are clever enough you can trap the dragon in the trees and race to the castle before it escapes.

Every time you reach the castle and get in you receive 100 gold coins by a way of reward. If you manage to complete ten runs and collect 1000 gold coins the dragon calls up its mate and you have to deal with two deadly monsters.

In this game you are represented on screen by a white square and the dragon by a green square. The dragon does not appear until you start moving.

To complete one run you must slam shut the door of the castle to do this you must be positioned exactly in the centre of the castle gateway, and remember you are not safe until you shut the door of the castle.

First up we have a few Multiface pokes for you. To use these pokes you will need either a Multiface one, 128 or 3, or a Multiprint.

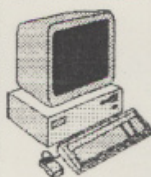
