CBM Mac rival

COMMODORE will now go ahead with its plans to launch a rival for Apple's Macintosh in mid-1985, despite a continuing legal battle with Atari over the ownership of the technology involved.

The Commodore machine is based on the Lorraine — a 256K, 32-bit 68000-based micro — developed by Amiga, a US

company which Commodore has been in the process of acquiring for some months. Commodore's purchase of Amiga was completed last week.

The future of the new Commodore machine had been in some doubt since Atari sued Amiga earlier in the year in a dispute over chips — used

in the Lorraine — developed by Amiga for Atari. Atari claimed that Amiga did not complete the contract and then offered the chips for sale to third parties.


Now there is confusion over how the sale of Amiga to Commodore will affect the law suit. Steven Greenberg of

Atari plans up-market 800 XL micro

ATARI is to launch a new 128K version of its 800XL computer, as well as new 16- and 32-bit micros, in its renewed assault on the micro market.

"The 800XL, now selling at £169, will be the figurehead of

the 8-bit range, and we will also be producing a 128K machine in this series," confirmed Simon Westbrook, Atari Corporation (UK)'s managing director.

"Then we will be introducing 16-bit and 32-bit machines, as talked about by Sam Tramiel earlier this year, which will involve much superior technology. Software for these will be both for business and domestic purposes." These up-market machines are expected to be 68000 processor based.

Atari is planning to offer a range of hard disc units with the more sophisticated machines, up to an IBM-compatible level. The company will also continue to support the lower, end of the market.

Advance — IBM takes action

COMPUTER giant IBM has taken action regarding the Advance 86a and B IBM-compatible micros.

Discussion between Ferranti, manufacturers of the Advance machines, and IBM have been going on for some time, regarding the Rom chips used in the Advance.

IBM claimed that the Ad-

vance Rom is a 90% direct copy of the Rom developed by IBM for its PC range. Now an agreement has been reached between the companies involved. A spokeswoman for IBM said, "IBM has concluded that a program in the Advance's Rom is an unauthorised copy of the basic input/output system on the IBM PC. Having been infor-

med of the infringement, Ferranti, Advance and W H Smith the distributors, have all agreed to cease infringements." It now seems likely Advance will alter the 86 micros' Rom chip.

At £1500, the Advance 86b undercuts the basic IBM-PC by nearly £1000, while the 86a sells for just £399. The Advance's 8086 processor runs up to 40% faster than the PC's 8088 chip.

Last week one amateur Commodore 64 'hacker' succeeded where our government has so far failed. He lifted the exchange rate to \$50 to the pound.

Actually what he did was to use his modem to break into the *Financial Times*' reserved pages on the Prestel database and change the information displayed on the system as a joke. He also, while he was at it, gained access to the private mail Prestel area used by Prince Philip.

break in — apparently without too much difficulty — is considerably embarrassing for Prestel (and just when Prestel bashing seemed to be going out of style, too), especially as Prestel has recently embarked on a campaign to persuade big companies to take system space on which to store their own confidential business information.

Under this government's controversial Data Protection Act it is the responsibility of each database to ensure that its confidential information on individuals is kept as secure as possible. Anyone whose personal details are wrongfully disclosed can go to court to claim damages against the data provider. Taking action against the 'hacker' is not easy, however, under present law.

It must only be a question of time now before here are professional hackers — experts who, for a fee, undertake to pick open data files as directed and pull out financial data, police records or people's credit ratings and political allegiances.

There should be big fines imposed for such 'professional' hacking. And databases carrying private information on individuals should evolve systems to detect if an unauthorised access to the system has been made.



Commodore US commented last week: "All the Atari lawsuit has done is prevent Amiga from licensing its chip technology to any third party — in its sale to Commodore it is not doing that, and the suit makes no difference.

"We will certainly be releasing a machine based on Amiga's micro under the Commodore name. A date has not been announced yet, but it will probably be some time in the second quarter of 1985."

Until Commodore's purchase of Amiga, Atari was hoping that its lawsuit would prevent Commodore from releasing the machine.

Rocky Horror Picture Show game from CRL

CRL, the company which has recently released games based on *War of the Worlds*, *Terrahawks* and *The Magic Roundabout*, is negotiating for a deal to base a computer game on *The Rocky Horror Show*.

"We still have to finalise the deal, but everything is going very smoothly," said CRL's managing director Clement Chambers. "We'll be basing the game around the strange environments in the stage show, with the emphasis on



Clement Chambers graphical presentation, rather than on the elements of dubious taste in the show itself.

"I'm hoping the game will be out in the middle of next year. We'll definitely be doing Commodore and Spectrum versions, and as many other machines as we can manage."

Sinclair portable

SINCLAIR is developing a new portable computer, based on the Spectrum technology.

The machine, which could be available by mid-1985, will be fully software compatible with the existing Spectrum and Spectrum+.

Unlike other portable machines, however, the Spectrum

UNICOM has announced a full-feature modem costing only £60.

For the price, which includes postage and packing, Unicom is offering a modem, complete with leads, power supply and manuals, which connects to any micro with either an RS232 or RS432 interface. It features auto-answer, and auto-

Portable will be battery operated, requiring no external power supply.

"This is one of the many projects in the pipeline, although no definite release date has yet been set," said a Sinclair spokesman.

Research into new types of high-performance batteries is now under way at Sinclair's Metalab development facility. The Metalab team worked with Polaroid on the battery for the Sinclair flat-screen tv and is currently working to design the power unit for the Sinclair Electric Vehicle project.

● Among the developments at Sinclair's Metalab is a solid state drive for the QL. This silicon version of the Winchester hard disc drive will run up to 100 times faster than a conventional device.

Tangerine in troubles

TANGERINE, the company which spawned Tansoft and Oric Products International, has hit trouble.

Teknocron Circuits, an Isle of Wight company, has presented a winding-up petition against the company. The petition has caused some surprise, since Tangerine has been largely dormant since Oric and

Tansoft became separate entities, and Tandata was bought by Applied Petroleum.

"The petition concerns an argument which has been going on for the last three years," explained Oric managing director Barry Muncaster. "Teknocron made the circuit boards for Tangerine's Tanel Prestel adaptor. The money it says we owe them is around £4000 of outstanding interest.

Acorn micro music add-on

ACORN is to launch a music synthesiser add-on for the BBC B at the COMPEC show, beginning on November 13.

Manufactured by Hybrid Technology, the synthesiser plugs into the BBC and also connects with a hi-fi system. The user can write and program music on the micro, using a specially developed language, which can then be played back through the hi-fi speakers. The synthesiser can also be interfaced with a music keyboard.

Acorn is aiming the synthesiser at the professional market, and it is expected to sell for just under £200.

Other new Acorn products for the BBC set for launch at COMPEC include the languages *Logo* and *Pascal* — *Logo* on Rom at £69 and *Pascal* on both disc (6502 second processor needed) and Rom. A Winchester hard disc and the long-awaited 32016 second processor option for the BBC will also be announced.

For the Electron, the Plus 3 disc interface will be making its first appearance.

Prestel to hold inquiry

PRESTEL is conducting a top-level investigation into its security following a bizarre incident in which hackers broke into subscribers' files.

Personal identity codes of subscribers were printed on screen, much to the hackers' delight. They were then able to tamper with the *Financial Times* Stock Exchange news, so that at one point, the pound was displayed as being worth \$50 and break into the files of stockbrokers Hoare and Govett. They also perused the personal mail of Prince Philip — the Duke of Edinburgh is a Prestel subscriber.

"We are treating this very seriously indeed," said a British Telecom spokesman. "I can confirm that there was a severe lapse in Prestel security for a short while. Our immediate action was to change all the identity codes of our information providers, but we are carrying out a full investigation as to how it happened."

And as for having the Spectrum + dangled in front of us — well, really. And the funny thing is that my spies tell me that many programs using the cursor keys on the original Spectrum seem to be exhibiting some trouble coping with the Plus — even though the Rom is reputedly identical. Nice one!

Delete alternative

Here's a quick Amstrad CPC464 bug. If you type in 10 Rem and then hit Tab you end up with the line: 10 Rem →.

If this is run you get error messages 'syntax error in 32511' and 'line does not exist in 32511'.

However, things get curiously. Enter Line 10 → and you get a message 'Line 10 does not exist', so it appears the arrow is ignored.

Now try a small program of ten Rem statements. If the first one contains an arrow it deletes all subsequent lines if it is Run. Goto has no effect.

This then becomes an effective alternative to Delete. If you wish to delete the whole program after, say, Line 10000 you can achieve this with 9995 Rem →, followed by Run 9995. Interesting, eh!

Joystick ports MSX: Two D-ports. Spectrum: What joystick port?

Sprites MSX: Thirty-two. Spectrum: ...if you buy *White Lightning*... (Commodore 64: Eight, but who can control them?)

Real-Time Interrupts MSX: Eight. Spectrum: None.

Need I go on? If MSX is sub-standard, what does that make the Spectrum? If MSX is out-of-date because of the Z80 chip it is based on, what is the Spectrum based on, a 32 bit wonder! It is not.

All I'm saying chaps is that the Japanese have made a good job of their standard. Their machines are easy to use, well made, well laid-out, and use a more than passable version of Basic (OK so the Enterprise's Basic is better, but I think that this venerable machine must have been got-at by those nasty Klingons).

And the Japanese companies have done what we should have done two years ago — they got together! We the punters are the winners, or we will be if we take little notice of the misinformation which is circulating in certain periodicals.

Jeff Naylor's review of the Spectrum+ in the October 25 issue refers to a 'bug' in the new welcome tape. The keyboard tutor program will tell you that you need more practice even when you score 100% if you have spent insufficient time in any section. At least four correct keystrokes are required to get a pass mark.

As you are allowed to leave any section at any time, we decided that 'you need more practice' was an appropriate message for those who leave a section precipitously. Regard it as a bug if you will, but it is a deliberate one.

Incidentally, both the welcome tape and the new manual were designed for a much younger user than the original Spectrum items. Sinclair have thought that most Spectrum users, who are in the eight to 15 age group, may have found the original manual heavy going. After all, Sinclair did not envisage the Spectrum being used primarily for entertainment when it first appeared. It was thought in the beginning that it would be used by small businesses and in education.

Goldstar Software were specifically required to replace the original items with brighter, more easily understood, and friendlier productions, omitting the more esoteric technicalities, and maybe even some of the less esoteric ones.





Quest for discs

Christina Erskine talks to Paul Bygrave from Quest

The idea of the Sinclair QL as a small business machine has been given a shot of extra credibility with the recent launch of a wide range of business-style add-ons for the machine from Quest International Computer Technology.

The Quest QL Executive series (Newsdesk, November 1 issue) includes five floppy disk drives ranging in price from £249 to £599 — single 200K, 400K and 800K and dual 400 and 800K models — a 7.5Mb Winchester hard disc drive at £995, four memory expansion boards from 64K to 512K, microdrive and disc versions of CP/M (£49.50 and £79.50), and Tally, a comprehensive accounts package.

Quest's main field of interest, until now, has been in operating systems and Winchester discs for micros in the IBM/Sirius/Apricot range, making their move 'down' to the QL all the more interesting. Very much like Sinclair, Quest operates solely on a research and development basis — all manufacturing is sub-contracted.

Paul Bygrave, Quest's technical director, explained why the QL had caught the company's attention: "Initially we were interested because the QL used the Motorola 68000 processor — we had been aware of the chip's development in the US for some time and its possibilities. The QL's specification made it look like a good machine, and good for items such as Winchesters to run on. We also had the experience to do memory expansions — we felt there was room for an alternative operating system to QDOS, and gradually we progressed to a complete set of packages. Judging from Sinclair's record, we felt the machine would

be a volume seller.

"To me, the QL looks like a starter machine with considerable business potential. Perhaps it has been treated with some caution so far because it's not easy to define its market — we're hoping our range will help define one end of it."

Paul joined Quest in March 1984. Previously he and Ralph Warren, now Quest's general manager, headed a company named Raw Computers. Raw was sold to Quest Automation and re-emerged as Quest International Computer Technology, part of the Quest group.

The decision to implement Digital Research's CP/M-68K operating system on QL arose from a feeling that CP/M — apart from its large established software base — was more suited to business applications than QDOS.

Quest is currently working on a few refinements to the Executive series for the near future; one such is a utility to enable data file transfer from QDOS to CP/M: "We want our CP/M system on the QL to be able to co-exist with QDOS — to enable people to go directly from the QL to the type of machine they have in the office," Paul continued. "One sector of the market we do envisage using our system on the QL is people working on business at home. They will be able to take their data on disc from the QL and feed it straight into their office micro."

Other work in progress includes the facility to allow the floppy disc drives to run 3½ inch and 8inch discs — at the moment they run 5¼ inch only. "We chose

5¼ inch to start with because it's the one most people are familiar with — and although we will release a controller board for 8inch, I don't really see it as a heavy-weight market."

Quest has been working on the Executive Series since the QL's launch, and have had Sinclair's full support throughout since, as one Sinclair executive put it, Sinclair has neither the time nor inclination to manufacture QL peripherals itself.

"Sinclair provided all the necessary documentation, and notified us immediately when the new SuperBasic versions came out. We also worked closely with Psion on our Tally software packages — we wanted the Tally accounts programs to integrate fully with Psion's bundled software. As a result, you can take data from Tally, load Easel, and have your data represented in graphic form without any re-input needed."

Paul is quick to stress that in bringing out a range of floppy disc drives, Quest is not suggesting any inadequacy on the part of the QL's in-built microdrives. "I think the microdrives serve a definite purpose, and the Psion packages are very good indeed, but some people will find they simply need the extra space and speed that conventional discs can offer.

"Obviously we're aware of the arguments against microdrives, and, yes, we did have some problems with them, but with our range, people can build up slowly to the level they want."


Quest's Executive series will also be made available in its entirety in the US when the QL is launched there early next year. "I can see the QL being very successful in the States — they'll see the machine as very much a home micro, but at a fantastic price — much cheaper than an Apple, for example. I also don't think the Americans will be quite so critical of microdrives, surprisingly enough. I think they'll see them as an exciting novelty — which may not be so good for our floppy discs!"

In the long-term, Quest is looking at possibilities for networking and multi-user multi-tasking on the QL. "We have an option on Digital Research's concurrent disc operating system, which is a system emulating MS-DOS for multi-tasking, but this is really looking quite far into the future.

"It takes a very long time to test the system — the writing doesn't take nearly so long, but I can't see anything happening before the second half of next year."

Meanwhile, Quest is still working on its Firefly Winchester disc range for the 'heavyweight' micros — adding the Apricot F1 to the list of machines to carry Firefly and looking at its possibilities on the IBM AT.

The QL Executive series, however, will form the major focus point of Quest's stand at Compec, the business computer exhibition at Olympia later this month when the series will go on show for the first time to the public.

Grasp is a graph drawing package which will produce variations about three main types of graph: bar, line and pie.

Before you can draw a graph, it is necessary to have the correct data. This data is stored in four 100 element files and can easily be edited. If you want to draw a line graph you must enter the x-axis data into one file and the y-axis data into another. This can be done using the editor, or, if the data is linked by a mathematical for-


mula, simply by entering the equation.

A graph of your data is drawn by pressing a single key depending on the graph format to be used. Other junctions allow graphs to be overlaid on the screen, tests to be added, and display to be dumped to a printer.

To define your own graph format you have to specify the type, colour, size, position, scaling etc. If you require it, auto scaling can be used.

Overall, *Grasp* is a very good program with extensive facilities which are clearly described in the comprehensive manual. With practice, complex graph formats can be described.

Zedis is a machine code editor and disassembler for the Amstrad CPC 464. It uses the 80 column display, 40 columns being used for the disassembly, the rest showing the options available and your previous commands.

The commands are limited to those that change the start address of the disassembly, insert a character string or hex digits into memory, move a block of memory, or search memory for a specified 16 bit

word.

The disassembly is displayed as a series of pages, each consisting of 24 lines forward or 80 bytes back. The disassembly on the screen can be copied to a printer by pressing the Copy key. This means printing a lot of code requires an equal finger numbing amount of key pressing.

As the program is written in Basic, it can't be relocated in memory, and use with another Basic routine will require merging of the programs.

If you only require a very simple disassembler/editor then *Zedis* may be sufficient, more than that and it probably won't be good enough.





The market for Spectrum Assemblers has become a tough one, and programs have to compete in the areas of testing facilities and



special features. Roybot's program scores well on both these counts, and makes up for a slightly non standard line entry and label procedure.

The instructions are entered as Basic Rem lines: not an approach I would prefer, but easy to get used to. Labels are not used as such, instead you refer to the line number of the routine to *Call* or *Jump* to. This rules out using a meaningful name for a label, and is something that many programmers will miss. However, the program is easy to use, and

different subroutines can be merged together allowing the build up of a library of different subroutines.

The best part of this program is its test facilities. It allows single step or slow trace, showing all registers, plus various memory locations. Also included is a fast trace and the use of 'Non Stop Calls', a sort of Express Coach of machine code to use with bits of the program you are sure work properly. The program also maintains a history of the last ten instructions to be executed, allowing some insight into how you got in that endless loop! Also provided are breakpoint, direct entry of instructions, and many more, all easy to use.

The only literature provided is the small cassette box insert, but as the program is menu driven this is not an important omission. Roybot's *Assembler* won't be everyone's best buy, but is good enough for most home machine code programmers.

Along with a suitable introductory book, it will give a low cost way in to this more advanced programming language.



For those of you who are not able to type, or who dislike doing so, there are many alternative ways in which you can communicate with a computer.

Joysticks, light-pens, touch-screens and mice are some of the more common ways of keeping your fingers away from the keyboard.

Now, Touchmaster, the company which has sprung out of the collapsed Dragon Data, provides yet another way.

It has produced what it claims is 'a revolutionary' touch-sensitive pad that sits next to the computer. This device (from which the company takes its name) consists of a wedge-shaped plastic case about 15in long and 12in deep, rising from half an inch in height at the front to about two inches high at the back.

Most of the upper surface of the Touchmaster is taken up by an A4-size rubber pad, which forms the communication surface itself.


This pad has a touch resolution of 256 x 256 points, and information about which points have been touched — using a stylus like a ball-point pen which is supplied with the package — can be transmitted in serial or parallel form to the host computer via a Din connection at the back. The company so far, is producing versions for the BBC, Spectrum, C64, Vic 20 and Dragon 32 and 64. Versions for the Amstrad and MSX are also under development. Micros that alrea-

dy possess a suitable interface, such as the BBC, need only a cable; those like the C64, the Vic20, the Dragon and the Spectrum need an extra interface (which is included in the price).

The Spectrum version has the interface contained in a black plastic box that looks just like a Dragon games cartridge. Apart from the standard connector to the Spectrum, there is a ribbon cable that plugs into the parallel port on the Touchmaster pad. The power comes from a power supply with an integral mains plug and the connections are shown clearly in the documentation, which also includes short routines to allow the Touchmaster to be used in your own programs. The proof of the pudding however, lies in using some of the purpose-built software for the device — the so-called 'Touchware'.

Included in the pack is a copy of *Multipaint*, a fairly complex graphics package. As with all Touchware, a plastic overlay is included that fits over the sensitive pad on the Touchmaster. This is blank on most of the surface except for a section about an inch wide down the right-hand edge that is divided into 40 small areas. Pressing these with the stylus controls colour, brush type and width, drawing mode and so on, while the rest of the pad is used as the drawing area.

The software on the Spectrum loads in about two minutes to display a blue screen with a small information area along the base to remind you of the ink/paper colour, drawing mode, etc. A large cross acts as the drawing cursor, and once the brush type and width have been selected, drawing can commence. It takes some time to get used to the fact that your hand is moving in one place, while the results are appearing somewhere else, but once you get over that conceptual hurdle, the effects can be quite good. There are brush widths from one pixel up to 32, as well as five different stroke



types, and the results can range from fine lines to a sort of air-brush stippling effect. There are also *Box*, *Circle* and *Polygon* commands and the usual *Fill* and *Print* routines.

The pad is easy to use and seems only limited by your own graphic ability and of course, the Spectrum's restrictions on colours in the same character square, which produces chunky edges if you aren't careful. My only complaint with the Touchmaster in use lies in finding where you are on the screen, as there is no record of your progress on the pad.


The BBC version of the pad will clearly produce better detail, and if a QL model were to be produced we could look forward to something approaching the electronic paint-box system used by TV companies.

There is also now, a range of software titles available for the Touchmaster pad, including board games, adventures and learning packages. The scope for a device like the Touchmaster in early education or with the handicapped must be enormous, as software can be written that does not involve reading or complex muscular skills, merely the recognition of shapes or colours and the ability to touch the pad.

My overall impressions are very favourable, and the Touchmaster would be a very useful peripheral for any computer. However, I don't think it will sell particularly well as long as it keeps its present price. If it cost £60, it would be expensive but worth having. At £145, it is considerably more than you would have to pay for a Spectrum, an Atmos, a Dragon or a Vic 20 or C16.

Much as I like the concept, at the moment you'd get better value from a light-pen, and you'd also know where you were on the screen.

Hardware Spectrum On-off power switch Micro Spectrum Price £4.95 Supplier TEC, 24 Victoria Road, Bromsgrove, Worcs.

Peripheral manufacturers have made a good living out of the Spectrum's budget-conscious design. Supplementary keyboards, joystick interfaces and sound boxes by the dozen are available, and it's only with the introduction of the Spectrum Plus and Sinclair's own interfaces that business seems likely to die down.

Meanwhile, TEC's Spectrum Switch remedies an abiding problem, by allowing you to switch off or reset your old-style Spectrum without pulling out the mains connector and risking wear on the socket.

The Switch costs £4.95, is designed with breathtaking elegance and simplicity, and adheres to the back of the Spectrum with stick-on self-adhesive pad. It clips over the power socket, and has a follow-on socket on the back.

It's unlikely to fit on any add-on keyboard, but some of these have built-in reset switches anyway.



The switch itself seems sturdy and reliable, and if you don't have the ability or patience to solder together your own reset switch, you would do well to request Santa to leave one of these in the toe of your stocking.

It consists of a black plastic box with internal divisions for holding up to 20 cartridges, and a hinged lid to cover them all. Inside there is also a small gap that can be used for anything, such as the sticky labels supplied with the cartridges, or up to four more cartridges.

When your bank manager lets you buy more than 20 cartridges, you can get an additional box, as they cleverly interlock with one another. The cost is reasonable, being not much more than a single cartridge.






Printing prettier

Take the strain out of listing with Pretty Prints by B G Merrick

SuperBasic is a powerful language designed for ease of programming. Hence it is perhaps surprising that no facility exists for indenting sections of a program when listed to show its structure, especially considering that this function is provided automatically in the database programming language provided in Archive.

This routine overcomes this deficiency by reading a program file from microdrive (or any other source) and copying it to another device (or back to the same file), formatting it by indenting all multi-line REPEAT loops, FOR loops, SElect switches, PROCedures, FUNctions and IF statements as it goes.

In order to use this program, first save the code to be formatted. Then load and run this program. The program prompts for a source and a destination file. The full name including the device should be entered, for example, 'mdv1-pretty' as this provides consistency with SuperBasic commands and allows a file to be formatted to a printer. However, if just Enter is pressed in response to the destination file prompt, and the file is on microdrive, this program will just copy the file to a temporary file as the source, delete the original file and use this as the destination file. At the end of the program the temporary file is deleted.

Main Routine

This initially prompts the user to determine the file names to use and if required copies the original file (Source\$) to a temporary file and deletes the old version.

After opening the files (Lines 240 and 250) the routine enters a loop which terminates when the end of the source file is reached. Within the loop the program reads a line at a time, calling Num to strip any leading spaces from the line, and print the line number to the destination file. The variable Spc holds the number of spaces to be placed between the line number and the first command of a line. The amount this is to be altered before and after printing the line is held in Before and After respectively. The procedure Spaces determines the values of these variables for the line. Line 340 ensures that an error will not occur if a program with incorrect syntax is passed through this program. Line 350 actually prints the line using Fill\$ to provide a string of spaces.

On exit from the loop, the channels are closed and if used the temporary file is deleted.

Procedure Num

This routine consists of three parts. The first, Lines 460 to 490 simply removes any leading spaces from the line. The second,

Lines 500 to 550 gets the line number and prints this right justified in a space of 5 characters (Line 550).

The final part (Lines 560 to 600) is identical to the first part except that it removes spaces from after the line number.

Procedure Spaces

This section of the program compares the start of a program line with the statements listed in Lines 930 and 940 as data. If a match is found the For loop terminates with a value of 1 to 9 in N, representing the commands in the Data statements. If no match is found N contains the value 10, hence the dummy command '*' at the end of Line 940 preventing an error on the tenth Read.

Colon is then set to a truth value representing whether the line contains more than one statement by first testing for the presence of a colon and ensuring that this is not the end of the line.

This can then be used to determine whether or not a structure exists in its single or multi-line form.

The routine then switches on the value of N to determine the change in spacing for different statements. The only points to note here are that as a multi-line structure can start on the same line as an ON= or =switch. Spaces is called recursively, with the remainder of the line being passed as its parameter. A test for Then statement is made in the part that deals with If.

Procedure Diff

This procedure simply updates the values of Before and After by adding its parameters to them.



Noises off

Try using these sound effects to give that professional touch to your programs, from **Mark Gornall**

This program demonstrates seven different sound effects using the SID chip. You may look upon them as an example of Commodore 64 sound or you may prefer to use them in your own programs, expanding and improving a particular sound to your own taste.

The program is menu driven, and lets you choose a particular sound or you can play all seven sounds one after the other. You can change the wave form being used, but it should be noted that some sounds may play better in one wave form than another. Here is a short description of each routine.

Sound One plays two notes in a For/Next loop, but one note is always much higher

than the other, giving the effect a rough musical scale. *Sound Two* uses ring modulation of voices one and three to produce a strange sound. *Sound Three* plays random notes, but the Sustain/Release is set to give a pleasant effect. *Sound Four* plays two notes in the chosen wave form and two notes of white noise all the way up the scale, using voices one and two. It sounds best in saw tooth wave form. *Sound Five* imitates multiple explosions using all three voices. It sounds best in white noise wave form. *Sound Six* plays two musical scales, one starting at the bottom, playing up, and one starting at the top, playing down, using voices one and two. *Sound Seven* is my

favourite. It plays a small echo using voice one and sounds great in all wave forms. You may like to try changing Line 228 to ForI=0T040.

I can never make up my mind which sounds best.






The dread beast scrolls

The first of three machine-code routines for the Dragon 32 by Roger Walton

The Dragon has a poor reputation for lack of quality in its games software. This has often been due to the use of PMode 4 graphics displays. Although these provide maximum resolution, the user is limited to a two colour display. More recently, programs have appeared using PMode 3 graphics which are visually more appealing. With careful programming, excellent display becomes possible.

The purpose of this series is to provide a number of machine-code utilities which may be incorporated into programs using PMode 3.

PMode 3 requires four pages of graphics memory to display a full screen. The memory set aside for graphics by the Dragon 32 is reserved by the PClear command. PClear 4 is the default value. In normal use, memory addresses &H0600 to &H1DFF, a total of 6144 bytes of Ram, are used by PMode 3.

Each point displayed on the screen consists of two bits of memory. This means that each byte will display four points on the screen, giving $4 \times 32 = 128$ points per row. There are 192 rows down the screen so the display is 128×192 in PMode 3.

The bit patterns within a byte determine the colour which is displayed. The following table shows how this works:

bit pattern	colour displayed	
	Screen 1,0	Screen 1,1
00	green	buff
01	yellow	cyan
10	blue	magenta
11	red	orange

In the first program a routine is provided which will scroll a section of the screen to the left, two bits at a time. 'Wrap-around' has is to stop should be Poked into &H7F69 (see Basic listing one).

the screen as it disappears from the left. The full width of the screen is scrolled but the vertical height of the section scrolling can be set by the user. This is done by Poking the appropriate y-coordinates before Execing the routine. The y-coordinate at which the scroll should start needs to be Poked into &H7F68. The address at which the scroll is to stop should be Poked into &H7F69, (see Basic listing one).

An example of a use for this program would be to scroll a set of options across the bottom of the screen, as in the excellent Chuckie Egg game. A later article will provide a character set for this purpose.

The assembler listing is provided so that you can see how the routine works. The next article will show how to scroll the screen to the right and upwards.

Price war

The price war on modems — predicted in Baud Walk on several occasions — is now showing signs of hotting up with the arrival of the cheapest yet approved 300/300 unit and some price slashing going on in the multi-standard modem arena.

Enter Answercall, best known for their business activities in telecommunications —

their *Minimo* modem shipped in from off-shore costs just £75.

The modem is very compact it's about half the size of a Spectrum — and comes with a power pack too. It has LCD to show when the line has been grabbed or dropped and all in all is a very neat package.

The drawback is that Answercall do not offer any software or recommend any software in the enclosed instructions. I would have thought this would have been a natural thing to do given that it's aimed at the home/hobbyist market as well as office automation uses — ie, hooked up to a word processor for telex.

In the multi-standard modem arena, Pace is currently offering its all-singing, all-dancing Nightingale for £136.85, the cheapest yet.

Nothing much appears to be stirring on the bulletin board front, but I know of at least one modem company which is planning to bring out bulletin board software to encourage growth of those types of dial-up databases.

About to break in a couple of weeks time is a Channel 4 advertising campaign from Micronet 800 who have been busily arranging demonstration centres so people can see the database before deciding to buy a modem and subscribe to the service.

I understand many Boots stores and some John Lewis and Spectrum Group stores will be offering this facility. If you already have a 1200/75 modem with viewdata software you could contact Freephone Prestel and arrange to see a

demonstration database from the comfort of your armchair, so to speak.

And just a little snippet to keep you hanging on ... a major publishing company is about to announce an education network service offering electronic mail and data file exchange possibilities. I'm sure PCW's intrepid reporting team will be at the official launch.

Versions of *Manic Miner* are similarly being prepared for the BBC, Amstrad, Dragon and MSX which must be a huge relief for the non-Spectrum owning readers of this column that are wondering what all the fuss is about Miner Willy every few weeks. Even the Vic has its own 16K version of the *Perils of Willy*. Infinite lives pokes will be eligible once the games have been around for a while if

you're happier hacking than playing games. (Incidentally I hope all you hackers are rushing to buy System 15000.)

Meanwhile amongst all this flurry of activity from Software Projects, Commodore owners should try to catch a glimpse of the game they licensed from American company Sierra Online — *BC's Quest For Tires*.

From what I've seen it has a disappointingly simple jump, dodge, rescue the helpless maiden plot, but the graphics are wonderful in that they capture almost exactly the nuances of the pictures of cartoonist Johnny Hart (no relation to Tony Hart) who writes the *BC* comic strip. His cartoons are packed full of inventiveness, humour and rich imagery and I am all for them being drawn upon to improve computer games.

Now on to the first couple of letters I have had about Ocean's *Decathlon*. From James Cockings of Sheffield

comes this tip.

"I started to play this super game in reverse by trying to get the lowest distance I could on the discus. The man did a quarter turn and I threw the discus up at 36 degrees. The discus went up and up till it landed in the crowd and I got 186.86m." (I think you should have got 20 years!) "My other high scores are *Halls of the Things 726*; *Invasion of the Body Snatchers 4650*; *Splat! 14,855*; *Penetrator 78,430*; *3D Ant Attack 40,844*; *Sabre Wolf 179,000*; *Chuckie Egg 221,000*; *Winged Warlords 14,000* (which caused it to crash); *Full Throttle 1st place*."

Spot check

Since computers have been around in amateur radio, they have mostly been put to use for logging and calculation purposes, as well as for transceiving existing modes of communications such as Morse or RTTY. Many people, myself included, have long argued that this was a waste of the available technology. What is needed is a new and more efficient mode or modes that use computer technology to provide faster, efficient and more comprehensive communication. This has been achieved in two ways. Firstly with *AMTOR* and secondly with the packet radio systems.

This week I shall concen-

trate on *AMTOR* and a new program for the Dragon which brings it within the range of the ordinary amateur. *AMTOR*, to put it very simply, is a highly sophisticated form of Radio Teletype which has handshaking protocols and extensive error checking. One of the great problems with RTTY in difficult conditions is whether the message has actually arrived at its destination. With *AMTOR*'s error checking ability, this problem is solved.

AMTOR is an amateur version of an existing system which is used on marine frequencies for weather reports known as *NAVTEXT* and for commercial transmissions known as *TOR/SITOR*. Until now, it was quite difficult and expensive to get on the air with *AMTOR*. Thanks to the prolific radio software house Grosvenor Software, it is now possible to use *AMTOR* on the Dragon. If you have a conventional RTTY interface then only a 1KHz clock circuit is required in addition to the software. The clock and/or a full unit is avail-

able from PNP.

AMTOR on the Dragon supports three modes of communication, FEC which is like RTTY with less errors, ARQ which is the full *AMTOR* with handshaking and error detection/correction, and a mode called *LISTEN* which is a monitor mode. As usual with Grosvenor's software there is full split screen operation, type ahead facility, ten user memories and the contact review facility.

A status line continuously displays vital mode and error information and there is a USOS (unshift on space) facility which means that the program always transmits the correct shift after spaces. As usual there is the 24 hour real time clock display which is instantly transmittable.

Dragon *AMTOR* is available on cassette for £39, on disc (Dragon DOS) for £44 and best of all, on *om* cartridge for £49. For people who wish only to listen in on *AMTOR* traffic, there is a receive only cassette at £24.

What I find fascinating is that

Grosvenor are producing their programs on cartridge which means instant and safe use. They are now offering combinations of their programs in this form as follows: *AMTOR* + RTTY or *AMTOR* + Morse at £59 and *AMTOR* + RTTY + Morse at £69.

When you consider that the Grosvenor programs are probably the ultimate in amateur radio software and remember that the Dragon is retailing around £100 nowadays, then it is beginning to make sense to get a Dragon to use as a dedicated amateur terminal. The total cost with all the interfaces/terminal unit hardware involved is still under £200. Such a possibility was only a dream a year or two ago.

New products ready for the expected Christmas boom seem to be flooding in mercilessly. Don't worry if you haven't seen any of the goodies yet — this is the computer market, after all, and the practice of early announcement and late delivery has become a tradition.

Perhaps top of anybody's shopping list has to be the Yamaha CX5M. Don't be deceived — this isn't just any old MSX micro. The CX5M is an MSX micro plus what is effectively an entire digital synthesi-

ser complete with keyboard, MIDI interface and Yamaha's DX7/9 hardware and software.

The DX7 and DX9 synths (which retail at around £1500 and £800 respectively) use a new form of sound synthesis based on frequency modulation. Previous systems have either attempted to reconstruct a sound wave numerically (direct synthesis) or have used analogue or digital oscillators, filters and envelope generators to produce a basic sound wave and then process it. FM synthesis uses the fact — long known — that when you combine two different sound waves by frequency modulation, the result will be a whole range of sound waves with different frequencies.

The technical details are elaborate, but the system is similar to the one by which VHF radio and the video part of television pictures are transmitted. Since the process is complicated, nobody thought to do it before Yamaha developed their

YM2151 chip. The nearest thing to FM synthesis was the production of vibrato — the effect obtained when the frequency of a note varies slightly and rapidly. (It's worth experimenting with vibrato on your micro to see how some interesting effects can be obtained — all you have to do is rapidly change the frequency or pitch of a note in a regular fashion while it's playing.) Digital techniques have allowed Yamaha to develop a set of algorithms for FM which can be relatively simply understood by the non-expert.

The CX5M comes complete with an FM voicing program allowing you to control the YM2151 chip which is contained in a bolted-on unit under the main computer. You get a mini-keyboard too but it is very small and the CX5M MIDI doesn't allow you to run the computer from any MIDI keyboard, which is a great pity, especially since cheap MIDI keyboards are now becoming

available (the £449 MK900 from Siel, to take a notable example).

Also unavailable is the Music Macro program which, like other CX5M software comes on cartridge (there's no disc-drive at present), and allows you to use the FM system from Basic. For those of us stuck in Basic without FM, the CX5M offers an AY-3-8910 standard MSX programmable sound generator, which is hardly compensation.

Still, at around £600 for the package, Yamaha seem to have come up with a winner.

The Spectrum manual, on page 163, gives a program which converts a date to the right day of the week. This program, however only works for dates of the 20th century. The program below works for any date inclu-

ding other centuries. This is based on the formula $V = A \text{ mod } 7$, where $A = (2.6m - 0.2) + d + y(y/4) + (c/4) - 2c$. m is the number of the month (Jan=11 of the previous year, Feb=12 of the previous year, Mar=1, Apr=2 and so on), d =day, y =year and c =(century-1). By $A \text{ mod } 7$ we mean the remainder of $A/7$ which, in turn can be found by the formula $A \text{ mod } 7 = A - (7*(A/T))$ where (A/T) is the integer part of $A/7$.

The book is written in a somewhat 'chatty' style. There are four chapters containing 50 problems with their solutions. All the puzzles require you to produce some result on the TV screen — simple words, random words and numbers, etc. Once these have been solved, the problems are made more complex when they are developed further with graphics and sounds. Not a book for beginners, but good for more serious programmers wanting to learn how to apply programming skills in an interesting and logical way.

Tony Bridge's Adventure Corner



Games without frontiers

One of the more amusing pastimes to which I treat myself occasionally, is reading the adverts in the Computer Press (without which . . .) — the prerequisite nowadays for a game to sell well would seem to be either the reward of a disgustingly huge cash prize, or the endorsement of some disgustingly healthy athlete (who has probably never been within five miles of a home computer!). If not one of these two, then the program is "The Official" version of some boring TV soap opera or horror film. Because of all this, software houses feel it natural to charge rather more than what used to be the norm for computer games. A price of £5 or so is, I think, not too steep — after that, beware! Programs such as *The Hobbit*, and *Elite* (the new spacezap-management-strategy-adventure for the BBC) are exceptions.

It comes as a nice surprise, then, to see a small band of software writers clinging to the pioneering spirit of a couple of years ago (remember when Bug-Byte and Quicksilver occupied little trestle tables and sold their software from cardboard shoe boxes?). When Gilsoft released *The Quill* a few months ago, I expressed the hope that programs written with it would stay in the lower price bracket — after all, the hard work has been done by Gilsoft.

The name of 8th Day Software cropped up not long ago in the Corner, and I am pleased to say that they have recently released a suite of six adventures, all written with the aid of *The Quill*, and all costing an incredible £1.75 each.

Like Scott Adams programs, the 8th Day products, which, incidentally, go under the collective name of Games without Frontiers, are graded in terms of difficulty. Thus, *Ice Station Zero* is a Beginners Game, *Cuddles*, *Quann Tulla* and *In Search of Angels* are moderately difficult, while only advanced adventurers should tackle *Four Minutes to Midnight* and *Faerie*.

As I've said before, titles are very important in attracting interest in an adventure, and these are guaranteed to grab the attention. The beginner's game *Ice Station Zero* is of the standard "get-everything-you-can-and-explore-as-much-as-possible" variety, in which you, the player, have to cross the Polar ice-cap in search of Stirling, an international terrorist. *Quann Tulla* places you in the shattered hull of a spaceship deep in space. Eventually, battling against robots and highly advanced computer systems, you are pitted against the might of an evil, corrupt Empire.

In Search of Angles is another James Bond-like romp, while *Cuddles* pitches you straight into the horrors of the nursery, from which you have to escape (lots of chances, here, to throw dishes of sloppy baby food around the place!). *Four Minutes to Midnight* is set in the devastation caused by a bacteriological disaster. Intriguingly, the player has to recruit five other characters to help in our eventual success. The other "Advanced" adventure in this collection is *Faerie*, which is a Midsummer Night's fantasy on the Spectrum, with all kinds of weird creatures, and hoards of fairy gold.

There are no fancy screen layouts, or redesigned character sets here — all the adventures are pretty workmanlike in their execution; all excellent value and guaranteed to give the keen adventurer, as well as the beginner, lots to think about. Each game starts off with an artfully-drawn title page to set the atmosphere (for example, *Quann Tulla* opens with a James Blish *City in Flight*) — unfortunately, the old spectre of The Spelling Mistake raises its head every so often. It beats me why, even in inexpensive software, someone isn't made responsible for checking every word.

Quann Tulla, as well as some of the others, displays one of the odd quirks which *The Quill* may be found guilty of, and which

the lazy programmer falls foul of — the limited-move syndrome. In many *Quill'd* adventures, this takes the form of "so-many-moves-before-the-player-dies-of-hunger/thirst". This is fair enough, of course, but the anomaly comes after the player has solved this particular problem — it invariably doesn't arise again! Now, this has always struck me as rather silly — after all, if ten (or whatever) moves without food/water is enough to kill you off, why, after satisfying that hunger/thirst, should you then appear invulnerable during the rest of the adventure?

Anyway, the present adventure presents this problem as a requirement for the adventurer to discover how to survive in an airless environment — a certain number of moves are allowed before you die of oxygen starvation, and the same number of moves are required to discover the gas mask and put it on. As this little sequence is at the beginning of the game, you can very quickly start again, and gradually eliminate all the wrong moves.

Ice Station Zero is conducted in a similar way — once out of the tent at the start, you are shadowed by a pack of hungry wolves. Make the wrong move, and you are instantly set upon and killed off. The rest of the adventure, though, seems pretty logical (for example, you may take your gloves off when warm, but you must don them again once outside). A good beginner's game, with lots of atmosphere.

The others in the series are also pretty competent. *Faerie*, one of the Advanced games, is nicely laid-out, with little coloured hearts framing the location descriptions, and rather hard puzzles, too.

Overall, the series of Games Without Frontiers is well worth investigating, even though Eddie Waring himself doesn't get a mention, and despite the fact that the frequent spelling mistakes sometimes lead to the player having to actually mis-spell to make the program understand (as in "GET THE BROACH"!). The price excuses this sort of unfortunate lapse, and the atmosphere and logical puzzles in all the adventures makes up for any bad layout — after all, the whole series is still cheaper than some individual programs. And 8th Day provide a complete back-up service, with hint sheets and clues. (8th Day Software, 18 Flaxhill, Moreton, Wirral, Merseyside L46 7UH.)

Legal advice

P West of Scarborough, writes:

Q I am writing to ask you for legal advice. I am 15 years of age and my friend is almost 16. We have written several adventure games and are trying to sell them by buying cassettes, recording the tapes ourselves etc. However, we do not know how we stand legally to avoid other people copying our games and what licences or other things we would need to obtain. Could you help us?

A There are no real legal steps that you can take to protect your software. The law as it stands offers little protection. My advice would be to put copyright notices on any loading screens, and also to place copyright notices within your program code. Unless you can prove that someone has actually copied your code, there is no action you can take.

Screen in motion

Craig Lambie of Paisley, writes:

Q I own a Vic 20 and I was wondering why the whole screen moves when I type 9*16 ↑ 3,8+8.

A Also, is there is a chess program available for the unexpanded Vic?

A Are you sure you did not type in *Poke*, etc? Location 36864 (9*16 ↑ 3) is one of the Vic screen pointers, so that is why the screen moves when you set it to 16 (8+8).

There does not appear to be a chess program for the unexpanded Vic at the moment, although I'm sure that some

wide-awake software house will immediately set about writing one now.

Ace stockists

Paul Dunlop of Horsley, Glos., writes:

Q I am very interested in buying a Jupiter Ace and I have a few questions to ask.

A Do any retailers still stock the Ace, if so how much?

A How many Aces were made before Cantab went bust? What modifications need to be made to a Sinclair 16K Ram pack to make it Ace compatible?

A Very few retailers still stock the Ace; you would find it much easier to buy one direct from Boldfield Electronics who now market the Ace. A 16K Ace will cost you around £50.

Sales figures are difficult to come by, but at least 20,000 must have been sold. The low cost of Ace add-ons makes it unprofitable to try and adapt existing Sinclair, or other bits and pieces.

Just a myth?

Lap Ki Kan of London, writes:

Q In one of your earlier issues, you revealed to us a device to allow CBM 64 users to run Spectrum programs. Please can you give me more information on it and its cost?

A The mysterious Spectrum emulator has not yet emerged into the sight of an eagerly waiting world and rumours abound as to whether it is just a myth.

From a technical standpoint the idea of being able to fit a Z80 emulator as well as a commercial Spectrum program into the Commodore 64 seems highly unlikely.

Just hype, I would suggest. Don't hold your breath.

Basic problem

William McCulloch of Bonnyrigg, Midlothian writes:

Q I have a Vic20 computer and have been pro-

gramming in Basic for some time. When I use the Ram area at the top of the 16K expansion, user defined graphics characters do not work. I would be obliged if you could give me some advice on this matter.

A As I don't know what you are doing, or how you are trying to create your user defined characters, I can only suggest what might be going wrong. It seems most likely that you have forgotten to relocate the screen in Ram or to have moved the character set. Both these actions are performed by the following code:

If this does not cure your problem then write to me again with full details of what you are doing.

Cobol compiler

Geoff Haydock of Salford, writes:

Q I hope to be joining a course in Computer Studies shortly, during which I will be learning COBOL. I would like to purchase a COBOL compiler for my CBM 64, but have been unable to find one. I would be grateful if you could supply information of any available programs, together with the appropriate addresses and prices.

A COBOL for the CBM 64... no problem... except the cost. You will need to run CP/M on your machine before you can run COBOL. This in itself is not that cheap. CIS COBOL is distributed by Microfocus, who can be contacted on Swindon 695891.

However, there is yet more bad news. You will need discs, of course, and a printer, but the worst news is that CIS COBOL

costs £488.75. Bad news, eh? Unfortunately, that is the cheapest version available for the CP/M CBM 64.

On/off power

Ian Adey of Halifax, West Yorkshire, writes:

Q I would be grateful if you could tell me the *Poke* address which switches on/off power to the CN2 cassette on the Commodore 64.

A Memory location 1 is the I/O Port address byte and Bit 5 of this is the cassette motor control bit. If it is set on, the motor is turned off, if this bit is off the motor is turned on. Obvious really, isn't it?

The other bits in this byte are used for very important purposes, so they are best left untouched. So, to turn the motor on you could write (in Basic) *Poke 1, (Peek 1 and 251)*.

To turn the motor off you would have to save the contents of address 1 and *Poke* the saved value back when you had finished with the cassette.

Price restriction

Paul Tang of Burton-on-Trent writes:

Q I am considering buying a modem, but am unsure as to which one to get. I am restricted to the ones under £100. Could you suggest one please? Could I get one in kit form for my BBC B?

A In the under £100 range, the Maplin Modem is probably your best bet. It comes in two forms: ready-made or as a kit—the choice is yours. You can contact Maplin on 0702-552941. Although the Maplin modem does not offer the same range of facilities as the more expensive varieties at £40 or so, it offers very good value for money to those just entering the world of computer communications.



Originally produced by Synapse — one of the top US houses — it is an excellent little game, drawing on, but not plagiarising, several arcade themes.

It consists of two main screens. The first is a swivelling maze, as in *Ladybug*, in which you, a drelb, must create squares whilst being pursued by two different sorts of nasty. This is fun. The squares change colour, and are now solid.

When you have made all the squares you can, they start changing into nasty faces... all except one, which is a door into the next screen. Here you rescue all your frozen Drelb brethren by tagging them, avoiding being zapped by new nasties. Success takes you back to the first screen, but

harder. Few frills, just pretty good.

So why is US Gold's other Synapse title *Fort Apocalypse* so utterly abysmal?



The source code is processed immediately so that syntax mistakes are immediately spotted — the program can assemble 3000 lines in under 10 seconds.



Grown-up's MSX

The latest news is that the CP/M disc operating system is to be implemented on the QL. Not only that but Amstrad will be providing it as an integral part of their disc system. Even the ever-receding Enterprise offers amongst its specifications CP/M compatibility.

Further confirmation that home micros are rapidly crossing the divide into the heady world of small business systems and 'serious software'. If you can control your feverish excitement for a second let's stop and think about what CP/M is, and what it can do — I believe that for 96% of people it is going to be an overblown waste of time.

The idea of CP/M came about as an attempt by Digital Research to overcome the continuing problems of non-compatibility between different hardware systems, and avoid prolonged and unnecessary duplication of effort in software development. In short, it is a sort of grown-up's MSX.

Despite its undoubted success I feel there are several prevalent misconceptions about what CP/M can offer that need clearing up.

The most commonly quoted justification for its existence is that it allows software compatibility between different computers and gives access to a back-catalogue of over 3000 programs. Unfortunately this is only true up to a point. Whilst the major headaches of software redesign and debugging that accompany a conversion from say the Spectrum to the CBM 64 can be avoided, you will not be able to go out and buy any old CP/M program and run it on your micro. No machines can be completely software compatible without the rigid internal architecture and Rom constraints that characterise the MSX machines or the more 'highly compatible' IBM clones.

What this means is that you will only have

access to the fraction of the 3000 CP/M titles that Amstrad, Enterprise or anyone else decide to convert, unless you fancy doing the job yourself. Only the mainstream big-selling programs are likely to make an appearance.

The other by question about CP/M is, how many of the fraction of the 3,000 programs which are converted will you actually want? The biggest barrier I can see for most people is the price. For instance the *Wordstar*, word processing package which must be the single biggest seller for CP/M still changes hands at the whopping price of £250 — more than most home hardware systems cost!

When you consider how many people make do with their versions of *Tasword*, or *Easiscrypt*, is it really worth paying ten to twenty times as much for something that, after extensive use, I can assure you is still a fairly average word processor?

As I understand it, some professional business software writers regard CP/M as having been a positive hindrance to the development of quality software by encouraging a lowest common denominator approach.

In particular 16 and 32-bit 'wonder micros' have been forced to develop a pseudo CP/M standard of their own to satisfy business users who are keen to keep the software they are familiar with and want to avoid the problems of re-entering data files etc.

CP/M is becoming a bottom-line standard perpetuating old technology in a way that many fear MSX will do.

In contrast, the chaotic non-standard home computer scene has seen the arrival of software that has squeezed the very last drop out of the capabilities of the hardware — just look at some of the Spectrum programs coming out now.

People who are forced to run CP/M on their QL because of a shortage of software should feel cheated — the evolution to 16-bit (or is it 32?) has been phenomenally fast so why slam the brakes on now and start getting involved with an 8-bit standard?

As CP/M begins to look more and more arthritic to business users, Digital Research will no doubt be delighted to see a new market opening up for in the low-end home computer sector.

Nevertheless, from Amstrad's point of view CP/M probably didn't look like such a bad idea.

After all, if you can find everything you need for your work on popular CP/M discs, why not run them on the best value hardware you can find? Besides which, it plays games as well.




