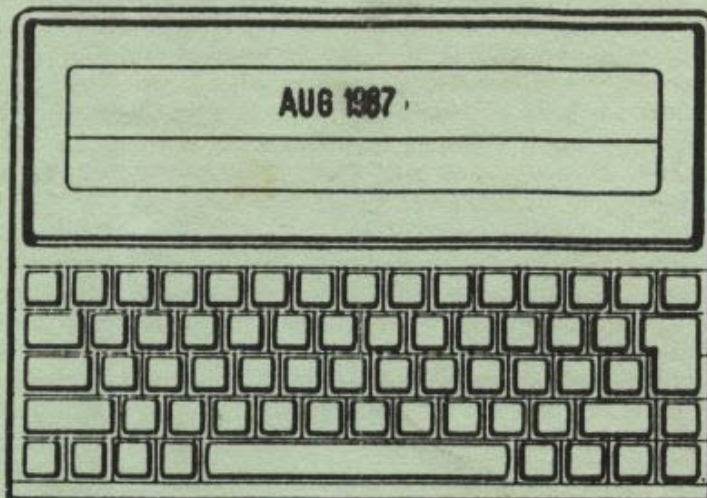

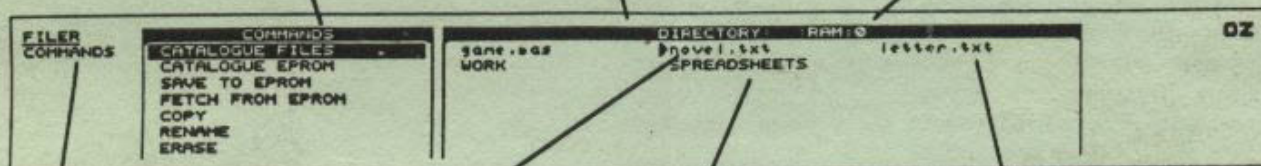

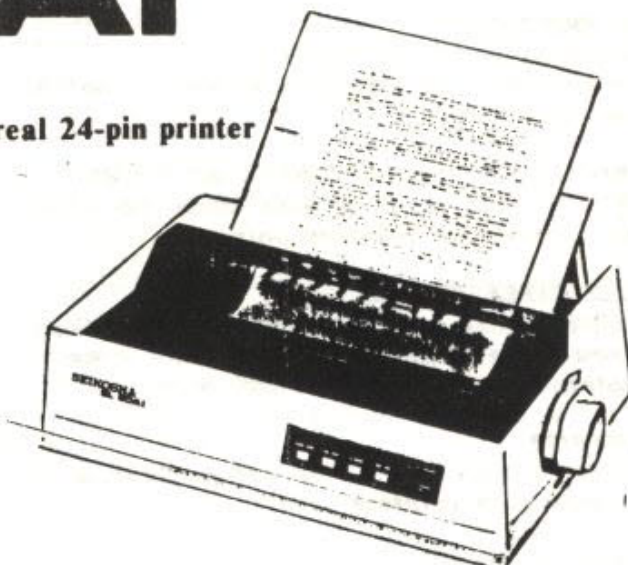

# NEWS

The QL is not dead. Two upgraded and improved versions are produced by two peripheral firms namely Sandy and Cambridge Systems Technology (CST). Sandy's new QL is called the Futura, ~ features a full 68000 processor, three and a half inch hard drive and a new keyboard. Through a software emulator it is Atari ST compatible. According to director Arnie Gardner launch will be in August and final specifications had not yet been decided. The price of the Futura will be more or less R2100 and upgrades will be available to 20Mb hard disc. Sandy is aiming at selling 30000 units per year. CST's new machine is an upgrade of the QL upgrade launched by CST last September. Called the Thor, it has an AT-style keyboard, 32-bit processor, optional Winchester drive and new packaging. It costs about R3600.

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Saga Systems, manufacturers of the famous series Saga Keyboards for the Spectrum has gone bust! Depts are believed to approach £80000. Former Saga boss David White blamed impatient creditors for causing him to go out of business. Meanwhile Cheñn Keyboards, the company headed by former Saga Systems sales manager Chris Smith, is currently seeking a buyer for 1000 Saga II keyboards.

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The new Spectrum +3 was used by Utilities firm Hi-Soft at the ZX Microfair in London in June to. An apparently eager public was told that it would be available from August 1st. The Spectrum +3 will cost approximately R870.00 and includes a 3.5" drive. Not all software available for the other two Amstrads will run on the +3. In the meantime, Locomotive Software has announced plans to make CP/M available on the new Spectrum +3. The CP/M software will be released at the same time as the +3, and will be bundled with Mallard Basic.

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A new South African release, THE 27th BLOCK is advertised in this month's newsletter. The advertisement boasts: "Move over, Rubik!" This should give you a good idea of the type of puzzle we are dealing with. The game is set in a three-dimensional block, consisting of smaller three-dimensional blocks. The idea is to sort them from small to big and leave a space in the 27th block. Retailing at R11.50 it is cheap when compared to some other releases.

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ZX COMPUTING's last magazine was published in July. ZX Computing was a popular U.K. magazine which dealt with the Spectrum. It was to ZX Computing that I first wrote when almost five years ago I felt as if I were the only Spectrum User in South Africa. This led to me corresponding with users from all over the world, finding out (from a person in PMB) about Information Enterprises and the subsequent establishment of The ZX Mushroom Club. That's the way the cookie crumbles.

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The unemployed Paul Denton was fined £550 in July at the Bradford Magistrates Court in the U.K. after he advertised pirated games in the Bradford Telegraph and Argus.

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Amstrad's new MS-DOS based computer, called the PC1640 has taken owners of PC1512's in the U.K. by surprise. Computing retail chain *Computerland* has confirmed that it will not be taking Amstrad's new PC, and *Open University*, which has a commitment to the PC1512 after it bought 2000, expressed its concern about Amstrad's support for the PC1512. Meantime, AMSTRAD has announced a new computer called the PCW 9512 which is to be released in September. Still with AMSTRAD, Amstrad has formed an Italian subsidiary to handle all computer, hi-fi and video products.

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Microprose has announced what is thought to be the first publically planned Spectrum +3 product for late August. *Gunship* is intended for release on the +3 hopefully at the same time as the +3's release.

DOMARK's good spirits at shipping out 20000 units of *Living Daylights* have been dampened by a loss of £3000 on the product at the hands of Creative Sparks Distributors. CSD was one of the major distributors of software in the U.K. and went into receivership on 13 July.

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Speaking about the new Z88, Cambridge Computer's marketing manager Peter King said "... then after six months, everyone will be using it as a corporate tool and buying it in the thousands." He added that the serious home market will continue to be targetted but more emphasis will be put on areas such as insurance, architecture and banking in 1988. King also dismissed reports that some mail order customers were still waiting for their machines.

## REVIEW

This program comes on a cassette and includes a very good Collins Gem Basic Facts Biology dictionary pocket which deals with everything from Abdomen to Zygote.

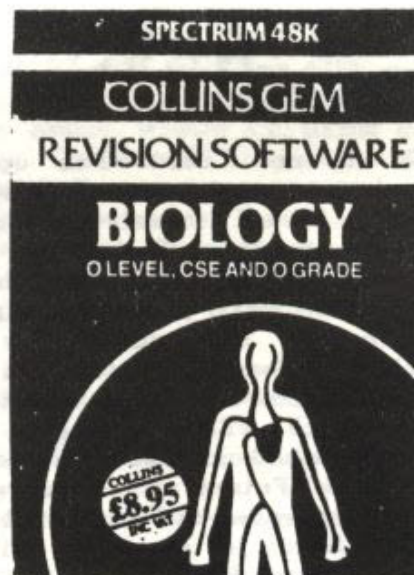
It is packed in a neat box which contains the cassette and the dictionary and will fit neatly onto a shelf.

On the cassette are 8 programs. The first is a Tester program which gives quick tests on the following aspects: Plant structure, Transport in plants, Photosynthesis, Food and teeth, Digestion, Blood and Circulation, Breathing, Excretion, Human sexual reproduction, Nerve and senses, Flowers, Fruits and seeds, Ecology, Genetics and evolution. After a particular section is chosen, questions are asked e.g. A blood vessel which connects an artery to a vein. (9) \_\_\_\_\_ and the answer should be typed in. If you enter an incorrect answer, the first letter of the correct answer is given, the second time you are referred to the Gem Dictionary. At the end of a series of questions, a percentage is given and you are told which programs you should do to improve your knowledge.

Programs 2 to 4 deals with diagrams. Diagrams of flower structures, eye structure, section through a leaf, section through the human kidney tubule, human digestive enzymes, the nitrogen and carbon cycles, the circulatory system, heart and digestive system are amongst those dealt with.

Programs 5 and 6 have more questions on photosynthesis, respiration, food and feeding, genetics, reproduction, transport in animals, plant and water and sensitivity.

Programs 7 and 8 comprise of games organised around a game of darts. Both programs cover Genetics, Food and Feeding, Water relations and Ecology.



These programs are of the best quality (certainly better than some other educational software I've seen), and deals with subjects taught to Standards 8 to 10 in South Africa. It will not replace a text book, but certainly will give you a fair idea of how up-to-date your knowledge is before you write a test/exam. I think it is ideal for revision.

The dictionary, on its own, is certainly worth a lot.

Also in this series : Chemistry, Physics and Computer Studies (these are not yet available through IE).

All food webs are delicately balanced. Should one link in the web be destroyed, all the other organisms will be affected. For example, in the pond food web, if the *perch* disappeared as the result of disease, the *pike* population would decrease while the *water* *scorpions* would increase.

**Food consumers** Heterotrophic organisms which, after green plants, occupy the subsequent links in a food chain.

**Food producers** Autotrophic organisms mainly green plants which occupy the first level in a food chain.

**Food tests** Chemical tests used to identify the components of a food sample. Some common food tests are shown below:

**Protein + Biuret reagent  $\rightarrow$  violet/purple colour (blue)**

Reducing + Benedict's reagent  $\xrightarrow{\text{heat}}$  green/yellow/brick red colour  
(blue)

Starch + Iodine solution → blue/black colour  
(Brown)

Fat + Water + Ethanol  $\rightarrow$  white emulsion  
(clear)

Vitamin C + Dichlorophenolindo-phenol (D.C.P.I.P.) (blue)  $\rightarrow$  D.C.P.I.P. (clear)

**Fovea** Area of the retina in some vertebrate eyes, specialized for acute vision. See **Eye**

**Fruit** Ripened ovary of a flower, enclosing seeds, formed as the result of pollination and fertilization.



**Fruit and seed dispersal** The methods by which most flowering plants spread seeds far away from the parent plant, thus: (1) avoiding competition for resources, (2) ensuring a wide colonization, so that suitable habitats are likely to be encountered by a proportion of seeds.

**Wind Dispersal** Air currents carry the fruits or seeds which usually show an adaptation to increase surface area.



**Animal dispersal** *Hooked fruits*, for example, burdock, stick to animals coats and may be brushed off some distance from the parent plant. *Succulent fruits*, for example, strawberry, are eaten by animals.

## EXTENDING WHITE LIGHTNING - By D. Roux

Oasis software released a utility called WHITE LIGHTNING sometime in 1984. It was, and still is, an enormously powerful sprite manipulation language and very good fast-as-machine-code games can be written with it.

The only real problem, as far as I am concerned, lies in the editor. WHITE LIGHTNING is divided into 23 screens with 8 lines to program in in each screen. Adding the command --> at the end of the screen tells the compiler to move on to the next screen. Unfortunately, the editor can work on only one such a screen at a time and your editing has no effect on the general layout of the program. If, for example, you wish to include a sound routine and the screen where you want to add it to is full you are stuck; insert a new line and the bottom line is lost. It would have been very useful indeed if one could have an insert command which shifts the entire program down when you add a line.

I have produced a solution using PAD, a temporary workspace used while editing. Follow my instructions carefully and you should be able to extend your WHITE LIGHTNING to include such a command. Remember to type in everything very carefully: leaving out even a space causes an error message. (CR) means Carriage Return; when you encounter this, press ENTER.

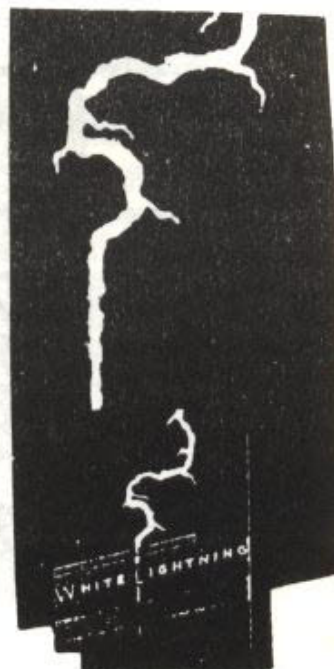
Firstly, LOAD in your WHITE LIGHTNING program and answer no to load sprites or load source. Now type in the following:

After screen 6 has scrolled into view, type this:

The OK sign should now appear on the screen and your program can be entered from line 0 to 5 of screen 6. Now type

```
6 LOAD (CR)
```

Wait a short while for the program to be compiled. When the OK message type

```
6 CLEAR (CR)
```

Get a blank tape ready and connect the correct leads for saving. Type

```
WARM->COLD (CR)
```

to embed the new command. Type

```
PROG (CR)
```

to enter basic. Save the code with

```
SAVE "FORTH" CODE 24832,15896
```

In future, when you load WHITE LIGHTNING from tape, load the header of the original copy, stop the tape and continue loading the new code you have just generated.

The command IST for InSerT has been added. There are certain system variables which point to IST. These are BGN, ND and LNE. BGN holds the screen where you wish to add the line, ND holds the total number of screens from 0 to the end of your program and LNE holds the number of the line you wish to insert. Always add 2 to ND if the total is less than 24 as a safety measure.



For example: you want to insert a line at number 6, screen 5 and your program stretches up to screen 13. Type  
5 BGN ! 15 ND ! 6 LNE ! IST

Unfortunately, this command executes very slowly. After entering it you could wait anything up to 20 seconds before the new program is listed with the blank line added. Don't worry if you see some flickering on the monitor while you wait.

All this aside, old WHITE LIGHTNING veterans will agree with me that it is extremely useful.

On the subject of WHITE LIGHTNING, try the following for some interesting noises:

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# REVIEW

The Tomorrow War

## Background

The time is 2035. Libia dropped 12 hydrogen bombs over Japan and China. Northern Korea was destroyed. Vietnam reduced to a massive plain of smoldering ashes. Russia declared war and America followed within two days. When all forms of hostility finally ceased in 2037, very little of the world was left. Australia, Europe, America and Russia were the only survivors. It is in this gloomy setting that Germany decided to unite all the countries again. Many of them would join out of free will, but a few would have to be conquered.

## Gamesplay and Aims

The aim is to conquer the 16 countries involved by means of war or propaganda. Some countries are stronger in some aspects than other, some are generally powerful. After a few games you should find it relatively easy to become the dominant country - by sustaining people, if you have enough weapons and a high morale. The game is divided into 2 sections of planning: a section for preparation and a section for propaganda, and a section where war may be declared. Gameplay is divided into years and the game ends when Germany has no more money, no more people, have conquered the 16 countries or when 60 years have passed.

## My comments

Being a strategy game, the minimum of graphics are used. All data is given in a 64 character wide screen format, something to keep in mind if you know that your TV does not behave when you use similar programs (such as Tasword II). The few graphical displays, such as the one of Europe are very good.

To play the game, one has to concentrate and take all the facts into consideration before making any decisions. A pen and paper comes in quite handy to keep trace of all the variables e.g. money, %'s, propaganda etc. etc.

Southern Africa is not included in the list of 16 countries to survive The Tomorrow War. Neither is South Africa the uniting country (Germany was chosen for this). Did the writers do this because of a lack of patriotism? Were they unsure as to call our country South Africa or Azania and therefore left us out? Or do they doubt the existence of South Africa/Azania by the year 2035? Or did they conclude that the Oranjewerkers would have established the Vaderland and that no foreign intervention such as a hydrogen bomb would be tolerated? Or did they seek legal advice and didn't want to be prosecuted for using they same propaganda techniques as you-know-who?

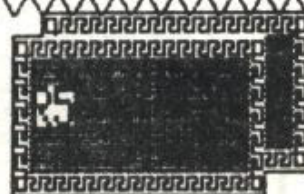
Anyway, apart from this apparent omission, the game's quality is as good as any from abroad, and deserves a good support from South African strategists.

Packaging is done in an ordinary cassette case, the inlay is (copied) black and white and the instruction booklet is (printed) in small print. Overall, the packaging is not as impressive as the British counterparts, but then you do not pay that much (rather give up on packaging than game quality). It is also understandable if one remember that South African manufacturers cannot invest a lot in production since the market is smaller than in the U.K.

At the price, it is very good value for money.

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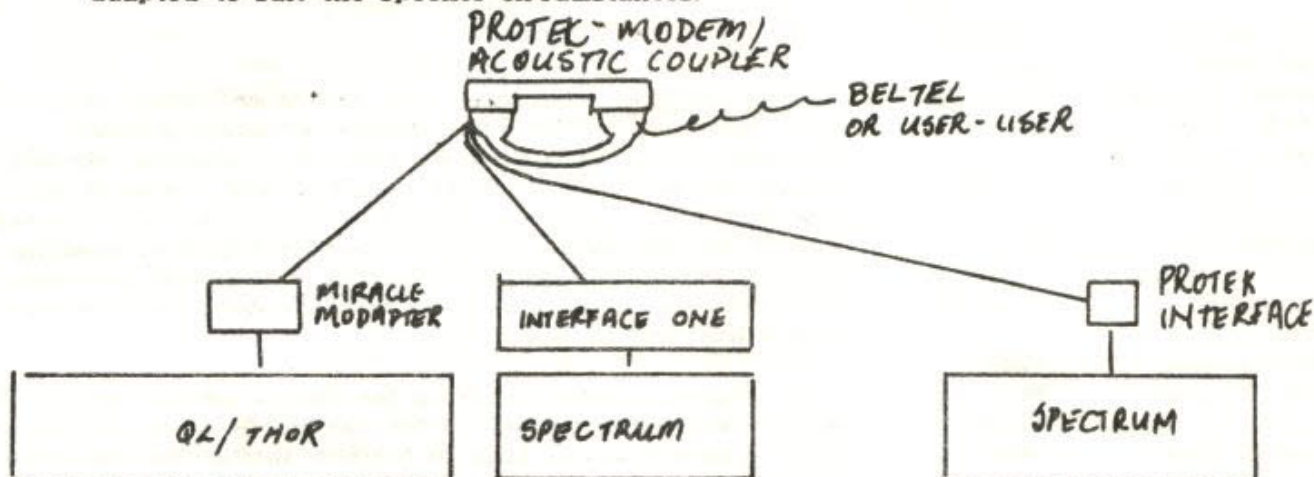

All our children come home from school and when they are very young it can be quite tedious listening to their homework. This little program helps with spelling. My little daughter can't wait to do her spelling and I usually find her waiting for me when I get home and I am most impressed how it has increased her enthusiasm and skill at spelling. Just as important, she is developing a computer key board skill and she is quite at home with the computer. She is 8 and a half and in Std 1.

The program starts by asking for the number of words. The arrays are currently set up for ten words of ten characters each. Adjustments to Line 20 for the number and length of words can easily be done.

The program then asks you to type in the correct words. After these have been entered, the program then calls for the actual spelling list to be entered. This can be done by simply calling out the homework spelling words at random. When all the words have been entered, the program then lists each word that has been entered by the child. Correct words are printed in green, followed by "OK!" Incorrect words are printed in red followed by "Wrong!" At the bottom of the screen a score is given. If all the words are correct, the child is given a congratulatory message. A small menu then appears which gives the option of trying again, if there were any wrong spellings, starting a new game if fresh words are to be tested, or a bedtime message for quitting.

Naturally she is never allowed to quit before she gets the congratulatory message!

The program works by a simple string search routine. For those who do not own a QL or have no knowledge of SuperBasic it gives an example of "top down programming" and the advantages of being able to write procedures and functions etc.

Reading the main program drivers demonstrate how one can tackle the problem by simply naming the steps involved.

I wish to emphasise that it is a child spelling program and one would not be expected to enter large numbers of words as the techniques used in the program are not appropriate for a full spelling checker.

The number of searches that the computer has to do will be the square of the number of words entered, i.e. ten words will require 100 calculations and 200 will require 400 calculations etc.

The amount of time involved in doing string searches would therefore be inappropriate for a large number of words. Nevertheless it will certainly cope with any normal child's homework. I do hope that some of our parents find some use for this little program.

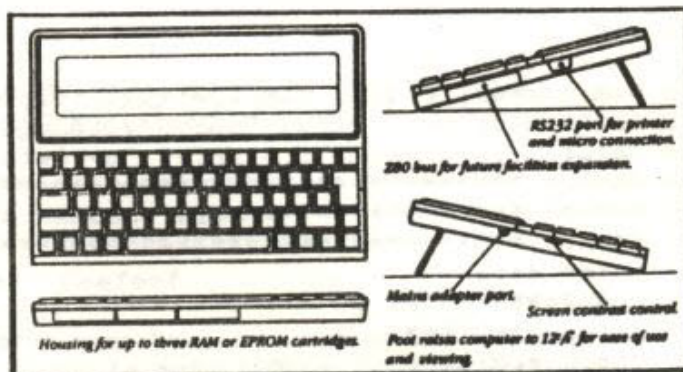

# THE Z88

## A COMPUTER WITHOUT COMPROMISE!



### GERT COETZEE'S REVIEW AFTER EXTENSIVE USE OF THE FIRST Z88 IN SOUTH AFRICA

One of the advantages of being the Editor, is being 'in' on new developments - and in this newsletter I share with you another of Sir Sinclair's dreams which came true. Yup, I had me hands on the only Z88 in the good old R of SA for 6 full days.

As you know, the inventor of the Sinclair series of computers owned Sinclair Research once upon a time. Then came bad times, and the company was sold to Alan Sugar's AMSTRAD. Sir Clive Sinclair founded a new company called CAMBRIDGE SYSTEMS (CS) and it was rumoured that CS would bring out a portable called the Pandora.

On 17 February this year on the Which Computer? show the Z88 was unveiled. Now, only a short while later (by Sinclair's standards) it is clear to me what the Sir meant when he promised us a computer without compromises.

#### PRESENTATION

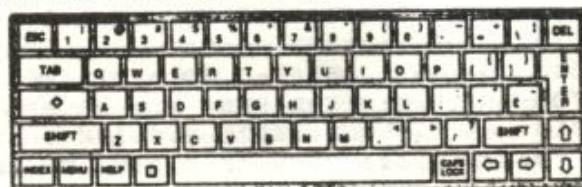
The Z88 will sell (through INFORMATION ENTERPRISES) at R820.00. It is sold in a silver box, 35cm X 25cm X 5cm which has a handle - promising real! portability. One side of the box opens (a la briefcase) and reveals a subdivision separating the compartments for the manual and Z88 itself.

So far, I'm impressed.

#### HARDWARE

As all Sinclair owners could have guessed, the computer is black. Its vital statistics are 290mm (width) X 210mm (depth) X 25mm (height). The keyboard area makes out the front 100mm of the depth and the display area the back 9cm (the screen itself measures 30mm X 250mm). The basic Z88 with batteries weighs 910 GRAMS! - hows that for portability?

The keyboard is described as having 'silent moving' keys. This however, is euphemistic way of saying it is made of the same latex (rubber) which was used for the original Spectrum. BUT PLEASE READ ON! When I saw this I wanted to cry, but got myself together and faced reality. I'm glad I did. The individual keys are not separated by a metal overlay as on the Spectrum, which made pressing of the keys difficult at times, and touch typing tough. The keys are not as close to each other as those on the QL. So, if it had to be latex, this is a good compromise. And let's face it, no other key mechanism would have fitted into such a portable. The underlying mechanism, as on all other Sinclair designs is a membrane. As SINCLAIR USER said in their preview "it isn't actively fingerhitting bad". In fact, my typing speed is 45 words per minute, and the Z88 handles it quite well.



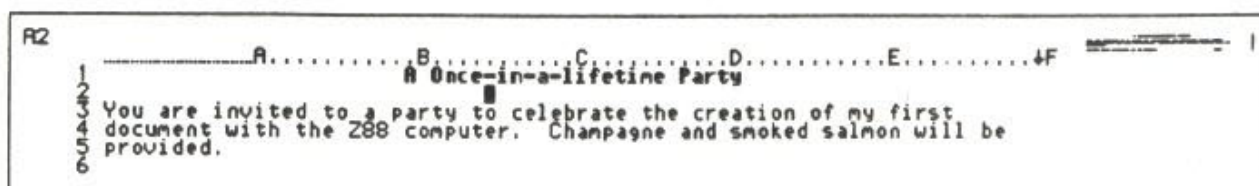


On the right hand side is a RS232 port and Eureka! I am glad to report that by the looks of it, it is a standard RS232!! The RS232 port can be used to print (any serial printer is supported through the built-in software), or to communicate with any IBM or IBM compatible through the built-in Import/Export software. This software can be used to export to, or import from any IBM compatible. A disk with converting software (R52.00) will be needed by the host computer and will make Z88 data compatible with Lotus 123, WordPerfect and WordStar data. The RS232 can also be used if the Z88 is used as a terminal (through the built-in Terminal software). This software uses the V52 protocol for communication between the Z88 and another computer, or the Z88 and another Z88. Another use for the RS232 port is communication through a modem (R347.00 from CS) which will be Prestel (and therefore Beltel) compatible - 1200/75 Baud. This seems like a bad choice - I doubt whether graphics will be handled satisfactory. The modem should rather have been 300/1200 Baud since most Text databases use this. Maybe some independent company will come up with such a modem.

Also on the right (covered) is a Z80 expansion bus which has all the possibilities of handling future peripherals by CS or independent companies. A useful peripheral could be a disk drive, preferably IBM compatible.

On the left hand side are a mains adaptor port, a reset button and a screen contrast control. The reset button is hidden and will only be used the day you buy the computer - no chance of accidentally pushing it. (Since the computer has a real time clock, it is never completely off, data is maintained through the 'sleep' state.)

The screen is a Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) screen. I found nothing wrong with it, except for the fact that the users eyes have to be in line (i.e. not at too large an angle) with the display. The backlit and supertwist type LCD may have been a better choice, but this takes up more space, costs more and needs more power. The letters on the display are quite clear, no flickering and in fact the best resolution I've seen on a computer/calculator of this size. One minor negative aspect is the lack of true descenders - y's, g's etc. sort of hang in the air -



On the rear there is a stand which can be pulled down to allow the computer to stand at an more acceptable angle. Also on the rear is the battery compartment. Four pen light batteries are needed. The batteries are said to last 20 hours in full use, or one year if when the computer is used the mains adaptor port (i.e. a power pack) is used. I would think that one should buy 8 rechargeable batteries, a recharger and swop the batteries whenever the 'batteries low' signal is displayed. When batteries are swopped, depending on the memory expansions in the Z88, because of a special capacitor, you have up to 6 minutes to make the swop without data loss. If you have the mains adaptor plugged in, you can take your time - no fear of any loss.

On the front there is a door to the housing of up to three RAM or EPROMs - more about this later.

The Z88 uses four main chips including a custom chip which handles the display and a Z80 processor.

The basic Z88 comes with a 32K RAM, 15K which is available to the user (equivalent of 2000 words). This, however should not put you off..

## STORAGE

As said before, on the front, up to three RAM or EPROM cartridges can be plugged in. These RAM and EPROM cartridges measure 35 X 50 X 7mm.

Ram cartridges are available in 32K (R66.00) or 128K (R165.00) units. This means that you can have 399K available as a maximum in RAM. This is enough to hold the equivalent of a 200 pages paperback novel, ready for immediate access and editing. The RAM cartridges can not be removed without loss of contents.



An alternative to these RAM cartridges are EPROM cartridges, available in 32K (R45.00) and 128K (R175.00) units. The difference is that these EPROM cartridges can be unplugged without loss of data. Should one want to erase the contents of such an EPROM, an U/V Eraser is necessary (R105.00).

One saves and loads to RAM or EPROM as one loads or saves to tape or disk on other computers. EPROMs is said to have more advantages - it is not as delicate as disks and do not stretch or break as tapes do. As long as you do not expose them to ultra violet light no harm will come to your data.

Needless to say, you can have any combination of RAM or EPROM cartridges plugged in at once.

Already under development at CAMBRIDGE SYSTEMS are 1 Mbyte (megabyte = 1000K) EPROMs which will allow you to have up to 3 Mbytes plugged in for instant access. 3 Mbytes will hold the complete works of Shakespeare.

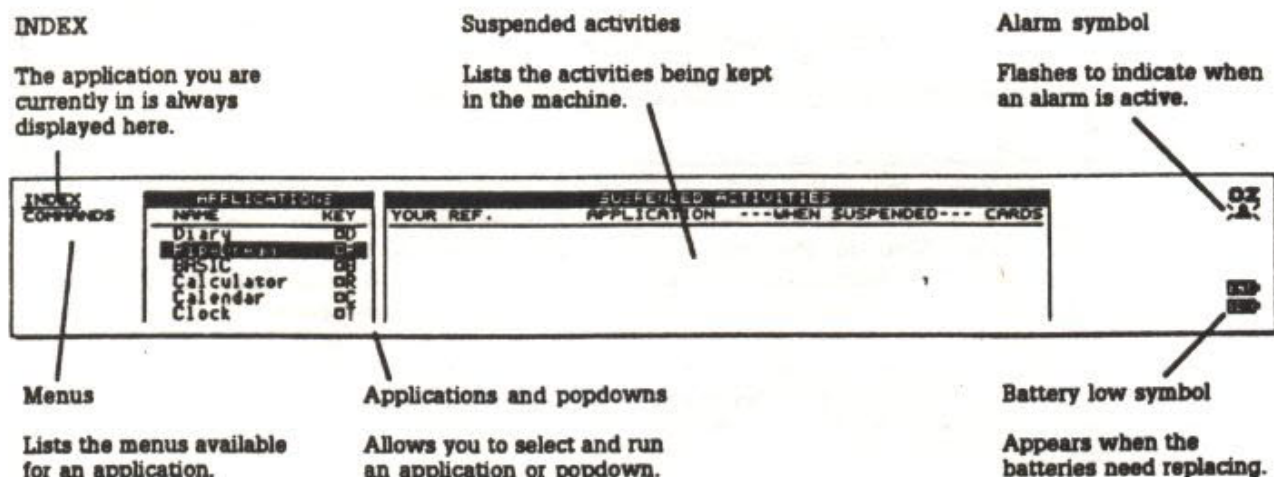
## SOFTWARE

Included on ROM and instantly accessible are a range of 12 applications. They are dealt with below.

The display screen for these applications is divided into four sections:-

- (1) a large wide area of 8 X 80 characters which is scrolled both horizontally and laterally.
- (2) a smaller screen map of the complete page in the case of the word processor, database and spreadsheet, which is changed and updated as these are used.
- (3) topic screen - holding options / menus.
- (4) status section - for alarm, memory and battery status.

Whenever the INDEX key is pressed, the following screen appears:-



On the right a list of all possible menu's for the specific Application you are using appears. One can access menus by pressing the MENU key. Of course, it is not necessary to go through all menus to get to a specific function. All functions have a code e.g. B for Basic, P for PipeDream, W for width specification etc., etc. This can be typed in directly using the u and e keys and the appropriate code.

The next part of the INDEX screen displays all suspended activities (or if there are more than six, the first six, the others can be scrolled to). Activities are suspended if you press INDEX while you are busy using an Application - it is automatically suspended and listed here. You can continue with this or any other suspended application or start a new application by choosing with the cursor. Information regarding suspended activities displayed are type, reference and day and time when suspended.

As said before, there is only 15K RAM on the Basic Z88 available. This 15K is used mainly to keep track of the suspended activities.



The 12 Applications are:-

1 The Diary - make an entry; move between days; search for entries; use calendar & diary together.

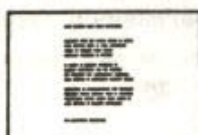
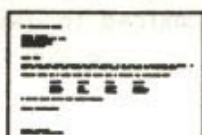
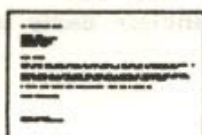

10 PrinterEd - altering the existing printer driver used in PipeDream for your own printer (incl. bold, underline, etc.)

11 Terminal - provides protocol for communication between the Z88 and another computer.

12 Import/Export - allows files to be exported or imported from/to IBM format.

## MANUAL

The Manual is a 25 x 25 cm, ringbinded, softcover, 212 page, high quality paper, book. As far as the user is concerned, everything is dealt with in full details and the user is coached step by step. However, the manual comes short on information on the use of the Terminal Application. (I've typed this review on the Z88, and then I sent it over to the QL, not by using the ununderstandable Terminal software, but by using the Print Option, through a Z88 serial to QL serial cable which I made up, and it worked O.K.)

Not to mention the complete lack of any information on the hardware - nothing about the expansion bus, nothing about the RS232 bus. Nothing. Sulk.

## MY FINAL WORD

YOUR COMPUTER said "definitely looks promising and if supported properly could be a great success". SINCLAIR USER said about the preview model "it's black, it's cheap and it's not finished".

My own opinion is that the unit I had for review is definitely the final product - state of the art, high tech good stuff.

Earlier portable computers such as the NEC PCC8201 and TANDY MODEL 100 costed approx. R1500.00. For the same price you can get the basic Z88 (R820.00) plus three 128K EPROMs or RAMs plus an Eprom Eraser. So, as long as you realise the basic unit is not your final unit, the Z88 is cheap.

The Z88's use as a cheap portable terminal for the businessman you will download documents and data from your IBM in the office and look/word with it at home. Journalists, think of the possibilities - you can send your article through a modem straight to the editors desk. Salesmen can follow the trend set by Metropolitan - they use the Spectrum in the customers home to work out the details of a policy - the Z88 is even more portable. Researchers, when doing field work, data do not have to be written on forms, you can type in data on the Z88 and download it once you get back.

As it stands, it is limited (as is the case with all new computers) but it has impressive applications and a futuristic design. With sufficient backup in the form of add-on hardware such as modems and disk drives, 3 Mbyte EPROMs, software on PROMs the possibilities are endless.

As a very powerful word processor, diary and alarm clock and general desk-top organiser I know that quite a number of our members will be interested in the Z88, as first or as second home computer.

## DEFINITIONS OF ABBREVIATIONS USED IN THIS ARTICLE

RAM - Random Access memory: memory which works like an erasable blackboard, allowing its contents to be changed, either by the user or operating system. The processor is able to use the RAM for programs it runs as well for storing data for immediate use. The Z88 uses a CMOS (Complementary Metal Oxide on Silicon) RAM - a RAM type which retains its memory after power-down, but even for this a very low constant voltage is still supplied.

ROM - Read only Memory: ROM can not be written to, neither can its contents be destroyed by overwriting or by depriving the chip of power - information is fixed by the manufacturer in the silicon.

PROM, EPROM: PROM - The best known erasable PROMs are the kind that you wipe under an intense ultra-violet light, but there are two other common erasable technologies, electronically alterable and electronically erasable (EAROMs and EEROMs). Programs for the Z88 will come on PROMs (i.e. ROMs Programmed by Software Houses). The Z88 User will make use of either RAM or (electronically erasable) EPROMs.
