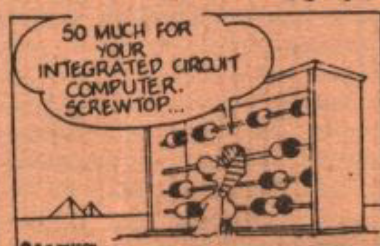

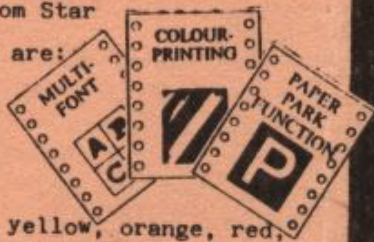
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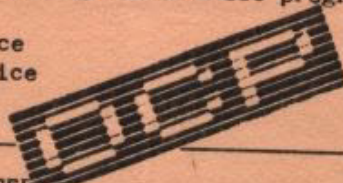
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# A voyage of Discovery

This article deals with those people who want to customise their TASWORD TWO wordprocessor. Below is a listing of part of the listing from the Tasword Basic programme. I got the idea and most of the information from Sinclair User in May 1985, and the writer was John Lambert. However, no matter what I did, I just couldn't get his listing to work. So I had to go and re-hash the thing, so I don't think there's an infringement of anybody's copyright. Nevertheless, these few program lines will allow Tasword to do the following:-

1. Allow you to choose how many lines per page your printer must print. this is handy for short stationery paper.
2. Allow you to choose the amount of line spaces left between each printed line.
3. Allow you to choose the left-hand column your printer must print from.
4. Allow you to choose if you want page numbers to be printed (these are at the top of each page).
5. Allow you to choose which line you want to start printing from. (This is part of the original program).
6. Allow you to choose at which line you want the printing to stop. (This is part of the original program).
7. Allow you to choose which page number must first be printed.
8. Allow you to choose any number of multiple copies you want to have printed.

The listing is fully compatible with any Tasword Two program, and works perfectly, as I have already sent in 2 assignments to UNISA using my customised version.

To enter the listing, go into Basic from the STOP Menu, delete all the lines from 200 to 299 inclusive. Next add the extended mode keyword 'VAL' to every number from line 20 through to the end. This is to save some memory to fit the routine in.

Example: GO SUB VAL "20": PRINT AT VAL "1", VAL "10"; etc.

Then enter the lines as they are in the listing, and when you have finished start the program again by using GO TO 1. Then 'SAVE' Tasword, and you should have your own multiple, page number printing, line spacing, left-hand column on page printing customised version of Tasword Two.

For those who don't like the sickly White Border colour, it can be changed, by using to simple Pokes.

POKE 64516,colour for 64 character mode

POKE 60641,colour for 32 character mode

I just put them into the Basic listing, in line 15, after the LOAD "" CODE statement, and it worked beautifully.

Also for those who would like to know how much space they have left in their Text File, they can add the following line:

79 PRINT#0; PAPER VAL "7"; AT VAL "1", VAL "0"; a/64;" Lines Used ";(PEEK 64150+256\*PEEK 64151+22)-a/64;" Lines Free".

There is one space before 'Lines Used' and four afterwards, and there is one space before 'Lines Free'.

May I say that this line is also changed from John Lambert's original listing.

Rev. Jonsson also made the following discovery quite by chance and has now got the program DUMPY working on his system with a Ramprint Interface. He chose the RAMPAGE INTERFACE on the interface list. To prove that this choice works, here is an example of a screen dump done with DUMPY. Rev. Jonsson would however, like to know how does he find out what codes are used there, and is it possible to use those codes to solve his other predicament, which will enable him to customise Tasprint to work with the Gemini 160 and Ramprint interface.

You must create a Pipedream document with the names of your files, one on each line, not at the beginning or end. Type <>FS to save this file, as filename.1, the extension meaning 1 for list. To use a multi-file document load the 'list file' but do not type the .1. The computer will find that a file called filename.1 exists and will load the first file on the list.

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# Spectrum lessons

## At last MACHINE CODE!

A BEGINNER'S COURSE IN Z80 MACHINE CODE - part 4

I believe that those brave souls who have been following this series from the first supplement will now start querying my approach - I have not explained how to write to the screen yet! There is a reason. It is probably one of the most cumbersome things to do in machine code. Let me explain:

### \*The screen memory

When we want to PRINT on the screen in Basic, we simply use PRINT "whatever". Now, what actually happens is that the letters of the word is read into an area called the screen memory. The screen memory resides right at the start of RAM - addresses 16384 to address 22527. Try POKE 16384,255. You have read the number 255 into address 16384. You should see a character size black dash in the top left hand corner of the screen. Now try POKE 16385,255. A black dash is included next to the previous one. This is what happens to your Basic word which is printed on the screen. A subroutine in ROM is called and each letter is converted to a series of dashes and other shapes which is LDed (POKEd in machine code) to the appropriate address in the screen memory. This means - are you ready for this - you have to do this by yourself in machine code! No more easy PRINTing! There are some short-cuts (e.g. we can use the ROM routine from our machine code program), but this will be discussed later.

You will note that I poked 255 into address 16384. Try poking some other numbers into the address. Do you see how to obtain different shapes?

255 is the decimal equivalent of the binary number 11111111. Look at the second part of this series for more information on binary numbers.

Imagine that 0 stands for "no pixel" and 1 stands for "pixel". It now becomes clear why 255 decimal (11111111 binary) makes a dash - all 8 the pixels are on. If we used 85 (01010101 binary), however, we would have seen a broken dash with gaps where the 0's are, e.g. something like this:

....

(very enlarged!) Try POKE 16384,85 if you want to see for yourself.

Unfortunately, the screen memory layout is very complex. I'll give you a conversion table in the near future so that you can move your own graphics all over the screen at superfast machine code speed. For the moment, try the following little assembly program:

Compile and then RUN it with RANDOMIZE USR 50000.

It should draw a tiny tree in the uppermost corner of the screen.

#### \*The attribute memory

As you know, the Spectrum has colour. Like one has a screen memory buffer between addresses 16384 and address 22527, there is also a colour buffer between addresses 22528 and address 23295. It is also referred to as the attribute buffer. This works nearly like the screen buffer, except that you cannot colour anything by the pixel - it works by the character.

Try POKE 22528,16. It should colour the uppermost character square on the display red. How is this colour calculated? Look at this formula:

Attribute = (8 x paper colour) + ink colour.

In the example case, I wanted RED paper with BLACK ink. RED is value 2 and BLACK is value 0. The formula applies:

Attribute = (8 x 2) + 0  
= 16.

Look at the program which draws a tree on the screen in the previous section. What if we wanted to colour it green on a yellow background?

Firstly, green has the value 4. Yellow has the value 6. Our INK colour is going to be green (=4). Our PAPER colour is going to be yellow (=6).

Attribute = (8 x paper colour) + ink colour  
= (8 x 6) + 4  
= 52

Add these lines to the tree program just before the RET instruction:

```
LD A,52
LD (22528),A
```

The tree will be coloured when you RANDOMIZE USR 50000.

#### \*PUSHing and POPping

When programming in machine code, you have access to a device called the STACK. PUSH and POP are STACK OPERANDS. It is reasonably simple to use. Consider an actual peg or stick in the ground. You have a few numbered cards in your hand. You PUSH one of these on the stack - say a card with the number 50 on. Now you push another card on the stack - maybe one with the number 20 on. The peg has a stack of 2 cards. The 500 card is at the bottom of the stack, and the 20 card directly above it. Now we want to take or POP a number from the stack. The only number we can take is the 20 card, since it is at the top. The next number we can POP from the stack is 50, since it was exposed when you



took the 20.

This arrangement is called a LIFO - Last In, First Out, stack. The last number you PUSHed on the stack is the first you will be able to POP off the stack.

In machine code, you can <sup>ONLY</sup> PUSH and POP the numbers in register pairs. To PUSH the number in the BC register pair on the stack, use PUSH BC. To POP it back, use POP BC. You can even PUSH BC and POP it back to another register pair, e.g. PUSH BC and then POP DE. This is the same as saying:

```
LD B,D
LD C,E
```

POP and PUSH are useful, since you can save the number in a register or register pair, and POP it back much later in your program. It will still have the value it had when it was PUSHed.

### \*DJNZ

DJNZ will be the first loop structure I introduce you to in machine code. You are already familiar with the structure

```
LABEL NOP
JR LABEL
```

This cannot, however, be regarded as a true structured loop. It never stops!

DJNZ is short for Decrement and Jump if Not Zero. It always involves the B register, and does exactly what its name says. It decreases the value in B. If it is not zero, it jumps back to a specific point. If it is 0, however, it continues with the program. In Basic, it would look like this:

```
10 LET B=255
20 LET B=B-1
30 IF B 0 THEN GOTO 20
40 STOP
```

In machine code, the same program would look like this:

```
ORG 50000
LD B,255
LABEL DJNZ LABEL
RET
```

The DJNZ instruction automatically includes B=B-1.

A drawback is that the loops cannot be larger than 255. We can get around this by NESTING loops. Consider this program:

```
ORG 50000
LD B,255
LOOP1 PUSH BC
LD B,255
LOOP2 DJNZ LOOP2
POP BC
DJNZ LOOP1
RET
```



Quite involved, you must agree. Follow what it does carefully. It is actually a delay loop of 1 TO 65025 (255 x 255). The equivalent in Basic is:

```
FOR i = 65025 TO 0 STEP -1:NEXT i
```

This will take ages to execute. Now try the machine code - a bit faster!

Look at this program:

```
ORG 50000
LD HL,16384
LD B,255
LOOP LD (HL),255
INC HL
DJNZ LOOP
RET
```

You should be able to follow what it does. It fills the first 255 bytes of the screen memory with dashes - when you run it with RANDOMIZE USR 50000, some horizontal stripes will appear on the screen. In Basic, the program would look like this:

```
10 FOR i=16384 TO (16384 + 255)
20 POKE i,255
30 NEXT i
```

#### \*Exercise

Now try the following. Fill the first 500 bytes of the attribute file starting at 22528 with GREEN paper and BLACK ink. Note - you will have to use NESTED DJNZ loops.

If you can do this, you know basically all that is necessary up to this stage. Congratulations!

Next month, I shall examine flags in machine code, the IF ... THEN structure and other loop structures. The answer to this exercise will also be given.

## HINTS & TIPS

EXTRA COLUMNS ON THE Z88?

It is surprising how vague the manual is with regard to extra columns beyond F in Pipedream. The information is there if you know where to look. To add another column, the command is

<> EAC. You can do this to a maximum of 64. Similarly, if you want to insert a column, the command is <> EIC.

There is a short cut if you know you will need many more columns. First start a blank Pipedream. then put one space at the beginning of slot A1. Finally, use the replicate command,

<> BRE, to create the number of columns you require. If you wanted A to Z you would replicate from A1 to A1Z1. Remember that case does not matter in Pipedream, it will accept alzl or Alzl equally well.

List files are another stumbling block.

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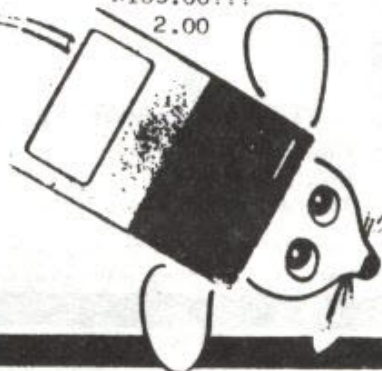

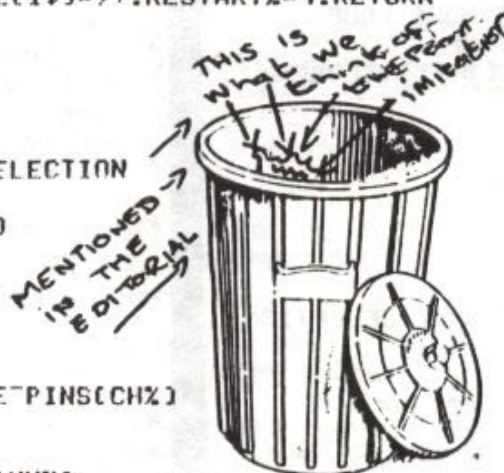
